MEETING REPORT

Background

The first meeting of QQI's Consultative Forum was held on 1 April 2014 in the Alexander Hotel, Dublin. A total of 46 delegates from a wide range of stakeholder organisations, representatives from the QQI Board and QQI executive attended the Forum. See Appendix 1 for a List of Attendees and Appendix 2 for the Agenda.

The terms of reference, stakeholder nominee organisations to the Forum, and meeting documentation is published on QQI's website. Mr Gordon Clark, Chair of the QQI Board opened the meeting and welcomed delegates to the Forum. Dr Padraig Walsh, CEO of QQI and Chair to the Forum provided an overview of the purpose and context for the Forum, within QQI's strategic commitment, which is to collaborate with stakeholders to ensure greater coherence in the education and training system.

Following presentations by QQI, the Forum delegates discussed specific questions related to the operation of the Forum itself and to the Green and White Papers presented. The outcomes of this workshop were then discussed with a QQI panel.

Emerging Themes

The **common or key themes** emerging from the Forum discussion are;

- 1) Building on the Consultative Forum it was widely suggested that QQI should establish *sub-forums or working groups* with potentially an overall *Steering Group* linked to the Consultative Forum.
- 2) A *thematic focus* should be adopted for the Forum; themes could be identified through the sub-forums/working groups and through the forum members.
- 3) *Communications* was raised as a consistent theme from groups, on a number of levels. It was identified that there is a need for QQI;
 - a) to communicate and promote its role widely;
 - b) to communicate and promote Quality Assurance in education and training;
 - c) to communicate more frequently with all stakeholders, ensuring targeted communication to specific stakeholder groups;
 - d) to provide updated and regular communication through newsletters and possibly social media.
- 4) Related to theme 3 above, '*jargon laden*' was identified consistently as an issue; QQI policy papers and communications are jargon heavy.

The following is a summary of the feedback and outcomes of the group discussion.

2.2 Topic: The Consultative Forum

The delegates were asked;

- 1) What topics do you feel the Consultative Forum could usefully look at over its next few meetings?
- 2) How do you think topics for the Forum should be identified?

The following is a summary of the feedback;

- » The establishment of the Consultative Forum was welcomed by stakeholders and was considered to be a very positive development “*this type of Forum is very positive*”.
- » Further clarity on QQI’s work plan would assist Forum members, “*if we knew in advance it would allow us to consult with constituent groups*”.
- » A number of groups suggested the establishment of focussed stakeholder sub- groups; one group suggested the establishment of a *Steering Group* to oversee the Forum.
- » Members suggested that there is a need to raise the awareness and profile of the Forum and its membership. It was suggested that QQI could invite feedback through consultation directly from the forum members, and provide an opportunity for members to consult with their constituents.

- » It was suggested that social media could be used as a mechanism to communicate more widely.
- » Forum members should receive papers in advance with sufficient time to consult their constituents and provide feedback through discussion at the Forum
- » All groups suggested a thematic approach to topics for the Forum. It was suggested that a matrix of sectorial themes could be looked at by the Forum. There were a number of suggestions on how themes could be identified, including through Forum members, focus groups/working groups and/or a steering group.
” Members should be able to propose topics; could use Forum members to liaise with their broader sector to identify topics”

A number of topics for consideration were suggested at the meeting and are summarised below.

- » International Students
- » Grade Inflation
- » Industry/Employer Engagement
- » Work Based Education and Learning
- » Recognition of Industry Qualifications/Vendor Awards
- » IEM and Accreditation of English Language Schools

- » Assessment and Alignment
- » Learner Progression from Further Education to Higher Education
- » Programme Validation Process
 - ~ Duration, nature and cost of the process,
 - ~ Support in translating QQI criteriaCo-ordination between State agencies in their separate but linked relationships with providers, and transparency of decision making processes
- » Review Roll-Out and Implementation of QQI Policy
- » How To Achieve Balance Between Different Stakeholder Interest Groups
- » Occupational Standards, National Responsibility and Development
- » Ensuring Public Confidence In The Awards System

Additional Comments

- » Use the 'Snapshot' diagram as a model to communicate and let people know what is going on
- » Concern about impact on not-for-profit sector and fees
- » Concern about administrative burden of QA on teachers and learners
- » Current statistical reports – Could QBS reports be brought in line with SOLAS?

2.2 Topic 2: Green Paper on Facilitating Learner Recognition

The delegates were asked:-

- 1) As the NFQ is further implemented nationally, how should QQI coordinate and communicate information on use of the NFQ and awards recognised within the NFQ to different stakeholder groups to prioritise the needs of learners?
- 2) This Green Paper is very broad in terms of scope. How should QQI best approach consultation on this paper to ensure that engagement reflects the wide diversity of stakeholder groups?

The following is a summary of the feedback:-

- » It was suggested that the policy development programme 'Snapshot Diagram' be used as a model to communicate this Green Paper and the recognition process.
- » Delegates felt that within this document and QQI documentation in general, there is a tendency for documents to be jargon heavy. While this may be obvious for those that are in the business, it can be very difficult for others and particularly learners.
- » Within the context of this paper, do stakeholders know who they are? Not everyone knows they are stakeholders. A very open discussion is needed by those impacted.
- » There is a need to speak to the relevant stakeholders and those impacted by this policy; there should be direct dialogue with learners and employers.
- » QQI can use existing networks to consult on this policy such as the Irish Council for International Students

- » There is a need for more coordination with all providers on what the NFQ means
- » In terms of the database of programmes and awards – *“QQI is very jargon heavy”*

2.3 Topic 3: White Paper on Re-engagement with Legacy Providers

The delegates were asked:

- 1) How should QQI engage with providers and other key stakeholders in communicating the approach? Can you be specific with suggestions?
- 2) In developing and scheduling the implementation plan for this policy, what factors does QQI need to consider?

The following is a summary of the feedback

- » It was suggested that *champions* could be identified amongst the Consultative Forum to act as a conduit for communication.
- » QQI needs to '*up the anti*' about the importance of this information. The legislation needs to be presented from the perspective of the provider – what does this mean for them? Importance for providers.
- » Language and jargon needs to be looked at, both in the paper and in communicating this approach.
- » QQI should engage with communities of practice.
- » Consider it from a provider's perspective, what is in it for providers?
- » It is accepted that rationalisation of quality models will be needed; previous model will need to be rationalised, people will need to know what is different. It was suggested that a gap analysis should be conducted for the FET sector - What will be the same? What is different?

- » QOI will need to consider the political fall out.
- » One suggestion is to conduct a risk assessment process to identify providers based on their relationship
- » Diverse groups within different sectors must be recognised. One size does not fit all. The whole model will not fall apart.
- » QOI should not get bogged down in legacy issues; It needs to consider the impact that QOI has on learners as that is what we are all about.
- » Consider the capacity of QOI with respect to Implementation and this needs to be communicated to stakeholders

Outcomes of Forum Panel Discussion

The following is a summary of the additional comments and feedback through the open forum panel discussion:-

- » QQI needs to match the Policy Development Programme and Consultation process to when people can consult.
- » One delegate expressed a frustration with the consultation process and external communication by QQI, - *“you don’t see any acknowledgement of the comments you made”*, and there is a *“focus on internal communications, not talking, meeting with stakeholders on a one-to-one basis”*. Concern was expressed that QQI changes policy without consultation.
- » It was suggested that stakeholders need to be kept updated on the Policy Development Programme and QQI work plan.
- » Concern among the not-for-profit sector regarding provision and fees.
- » The administrative burden of QA is a concern– paper exercise. Teaching being impacted negatively due to the level of administration required.
- » QBS for further education – statistical reports need to be brought into line with DES and SOLAS.
- » Concern was raised with regards to the timelines associated with the validation process; this is impacting in particular on the private sector and is causing a massive problem. It means the sector is not responsive, and the process is lacking in transparency.
- » *“There is a growing perception the QQI is developing a HE bias”. “Who ensures parity of esteem – have a matrix of central concerns?”*

- » QQI needs to raise the profile of quality assurance in education and training with the general public. There is a lot of good work and practice in the system, and this should be shared.
- » It is important that QQI maintains an international profile, at national level; this international profile is very important, i.e. the international aspect of the Framework.
- » There are predominantly domestic stakeholders on the consultative forum. QQI needs to maintain an international dimension. *“Maybe we could let stakeholders in Ireland know what is happening in Europe”*

The following is a summary response from the QQI Chair and Panel

- » The level of discussion at the Forum was acknowledged as very positive.
- » It was confirmed that QQI’s website is being reviewed and that focus groups will be established for this.
- » QQI is currently reviewing existing QA models and will be putting out an option paper in the coming months.
- » QQI is committed to updating the Policy Snapshot, and letting people know at quarterly intervals what is happening in policy.
- » It was confirmed that submissions and analysis of QQI consultation processes are all published. QQI has dialogue with stakeholders and has endeavoured to go out with many individual stakeholder groups, but ‘could do a better job on this’.
- » The communications issues were acknowledged by the panel. The messages may not be getting back, and Forums should as this can assist.

- » QQI confirmed that it does not develop or amend policies without consultation. Operational procedures may be adjusted from time to time without formal consultation.
- » The difficulty in timings on consultation was acknowledged. It is difficult to identify a best time. QQI acknowledged that it is frequently told that May is a terrible time, as is June, July and August. This significantly narrows the consultation window and presents a challenge for progressing policy.
- » It was acknowledged that domestic stakeholders have been the focus to date. QQI has a range of international engagement. It is the NARIC contact point for the qualifications framework, QQI's CEO is currently the president of ENQA and hosts the EQAVET secretariat. QQI continues to build on legacy work including the Bologna Framework and the Dublin Descriptors. QQI is informing international policy in a range of areas. There is an issue perhaps though in communicating to stakeholders in Ireland and letting them know what QQI is doing. QQI confirmed that it is currently building a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with its international counterparts.

Next Steps


QQI is currently reviewing the recommendations and outcomes from the Forum discussion and will revert back to the Forum members directly with follow up actions and proposals.








