Content

Mr Murdoch will share some Australian background, setting a context for their development of guidance and procedures in relation to academic integrity:

- Why is Australia the leader in this field? What happened and how did they respond?
- What UNSW did initially and the evolution of their approach
 - o 'Courageous conversations'
 - o Plagiarism as an academic skill/time management deficit
 - o Digital forensics point to potential of metadata in submissions and in VLE/LMS use

UNSW has significant experience in this area and has developed a number of sophisticated approaches to the above. The Australian experience including the development of UNSW's 'constructive conversations' approach to investigating and sanctioning misconduct with its focus on 'rehabilitation'/redemption rather than expulsion, will be shared. This approach has been vetted and approved by the legal team at UNSW and scripts have even been crafted to support its implementation.

Intended outcomes

These masterclasses will provide higher education practitioners (academic and professional support staff) who may have limited time and resources at their disposal, with a toolkit to help staff to explore, consider and manage the investigation, including the detection, of academic misconduct:

Bearing in mind that institutional resources are limited, what can be achieved/done in this space?

- What can HEIs be doing to identify contract cheating?
- Things academics can do to confirm at the initial level examples;
- Advice/guidance on use/potential/limitations of software solutions, e.g., Turnitin, Ouriginality and others
